



Bonfire Night displays

Explore the excitement of Bonfire Night and fireworks, whilst promoting fire-safety messages, by creating a Bonfire Night display at your childcare setting.

Learning aims

- Learn about Bonfire Night and fireworks
- Fire safety

Resources

- Black paper or card
- Bright coloured or fluorescent paint
- Old/used tea bags
- Paint brushes
- Toothbrushes
- Sticks/twigs
- Glue
- Straws
- Photos and images of firework displays.

Activity Outline

- Talk to the children about the photos and images of firework displays
- The photos may inspire some ideas for the children to use in their pictures
- Remember that some children may not have had first-hand experiences of fireworks
- Get creative using the brightly coloured paints and make a bonfire and/or firework picture
- Perhaps you could use twigs and sticks to make a bonfire picture
- Old teabags dipped in paint (or a watered down paint solution) are great to drop into the picture to create firework patterns and splats
- Splattering paint with paintbrushes and toothbrushes will add extra special effects
- Use the straws to blow any clumps/excess paint around your picture.

Extension activity

- Make a team-effort giant picture for a display
- Extend your creative experience and talk about bonfire and firework safety with the children
- Share the firework code and tips for staying safe with parents/carers e.g. use torches or luminous glow sticks and keep children away from the fire, flames and fireworks.



Working with babies

- Squirt two or three different colours of poster paints into plastic zipped document folders and then zip them up
- Model using your fingers or hands on the outside of the folders to manipulate the paint in the folders what does it feel like? Mix the paint together to make patterns or a different colour
- Use edible paints on a table top, on trays or a tuff spot tray and let the children explore the paint and mark-make risk assessing for allergies and constant supervision will be required.
