



Learning the importance of friendships

Encourage children to learn to interact and play cooperatively, develop and understand feelings and emotion, and build respect and tolerance with this week's friendships activity.

Activity Outline

- Read / watch / listen to the Rainbow Fish with the children
- Discuss the emotions portrayed in the story
- Use open ended questions to help children think about feelings e.g why do they think Rainbow
 Fish was sad?
- Talk about the importance of friendships and what it means to be a good friend, using words such as 'kind' and 'helpful'
- Discuss the importance of sharing
- Ask the children to recall events during the story
- Make a display relating to the story; pose open ended questions to encourage the children to think about emotions and feelings
- Ask the children to think about someone who is special to them and encourage them to draw a
 picture or describe why they are special
- Talk about emotions e.g, how do they feel when they play with their friends?
- Record the children's words and display them alongside their pictures
- Support creative skills by having a range of materials for the children to make a Rainbow Fish to display.

Working with Babies:

- Share photographs of family and other special people. Talk about who is in the photograph, making good eye contact and using facial expressions, such as smiling
- Tune in sensitively babbles and vocalisations in response to the special people they see.
