Eid al-Fitr

Eid al-Fitr is the first day of the Islamic month of Shawwal, which marks the end of the month-long fast of Ramadan.

Eid al-Fitr is an important Islamic holiday for Muslim communities across the United Kingdom. Many Muslims across the UK will take part in early morning prayer, dress in their finest clothes and adorn their homes with lights and other

Eid al-Adha, also known as the 'Greater Eid' or the 'Festival of Sacrifice', is a public holiday in Muslim countries. This important Muslim festival commemorates Abraham's willingness to sacrifice his only son Ishmael. It marks the end of the Hajj pilgrimage.

- Working closely with parents to let them know their children will be learning about British
 values as part of the curriculum. Provide guidance and information as to the type of things
 you will cover with the children
- Inviting parents from different cultures into the setting to talk with children about their different traditions and support with traditional activities
- Encouraging children to share their culture traditions too!
