

## Open-ended dressing-up top tips for nurseries

Often for special days like Fairy Tale Day or National Storytelling Week parents will rush to purchase their child's favourite character costume like Spiderman, Batman, a police suit or a princess dress for them to wear to your setting, but is this necessary?

These are often donated to early years settings once finished with, along with numerous outfits that you may already have. Although many children enjoy using these to dress-up in and role-play, these commercial outfits can stifle children's imagination of that particular character. For example, a child in a Spiderman suit may only shoot web from their hands or a child in a princess dress may only dance.

## Have you ever paused to think about providing open-ended role-play materials instead?

The benefits are endless! Open-ended role-play materials provide the opportunity for children to:

- Develop their imagination and creativity
- Develop their fine and gross motor skills as they dress themselves
- Develop their communication and language skills as they act-out roles
- Use new vocabulary, show kindness and empathy and develop their social and emotional development as they play together.





## See our top tips for creating an open-ended dressing-up area:

- You can still follow children's interests using open-ended materials. Children may choose to create their own princess outfit by putting on beads and a tiara but this princess may patrol the outside area or drive a train
- Provide a range of open-ended materials like real clothing (shirts, waistcoats), material, netting, hats, shoes, beads, gloves and scarves to support children's wider imagination and allow them to choose what they become
- Support behaviour by not providing popular costumes that they must share
- Provide open-ended dressing-up opportunities that are more inclusive and accessible. Often
  pre-made outfits are directed to boys or girls, all in ones can have difficult fastenings making
  it challenging for children to access independently and pre-made outfits come in a selection
  of ages and sizes meaning they do not fit all children. Providing a range of materials for
  children to use despite size or gender prevents this
- Reflect different cultures and traditions by having a range of multi-cultural materials
- Enhance the area with stories, books and positive images
- Encourage open-ended play with all ages and indoors and out
- Always risk assess items such as beads and scarves and supervise.
