

Top tips for supporting sorting and classifying in early years

Classifying and sorting activities help children to develop a range of thinking skills and build foundations for later problem-solving.

The process of sorting and classifying involves grouping and separating objects according to similarities and differences.

Here are some top tips to support children with sorting and classification;

- Provide real-life experience wherever possible - children naturally like to sort and having a real purpose makes it very engaging and helps them to develop skills for life
- Provide manipulatives for problem-solving manipulatives are objects that children can use,
 such as pine cones, to perceive a mathematical
 concept. The use of manipulatives provides a way



for children to learn concepts through developmentally appropriate hands-on experience

- Allow children to set their own categories or make their own patterns, rather than always giving sets to work with
- **Support children's confidence** by encouraging them to talk about and explain their thinking. Value their contribution, even if their answer is wrong
- Practice allow resources, time and space for lots of practice
- **Join in** engage in problem-solving alongside children and pose open-ended questions which help to encourage their thinking and problem-solving skills.
