

Nursery pets

- Before you purchase your pet, you will need to research its requirements and set up a rota for weekend caring, feeding and cage cleaning
- Get your pet from a shelter or buy it from a reputable vendor to ensure the animal is well
- Seek advice in safe caring methods as well as purchase pet insurance
- If you have decided on a larger pet, you will need to register it with the local vet and keep their vaccinations up to date
- Some animals will be frightened of loud noises so get advice on where best to position their home so they have a safe and quiet area to escape to.
